

DRIVE THROUGH FLORIDA LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY

Animal Products and By-Products

Directions: Most Americans do not know the source of their food, clothes, fuel and other products. This short activity gives students a glimpse of the extensive list of all the products that come from farm animals. Cut out each animal and put it on the board or somewhere in the room so all students can see them. Cut out each of the animal products or by products. Hand out each of the products to students or go through each one as a class. An extension for older students is to put students into groups and have them research what other products or by products come from each animal.

There are a few products that can come from more than one animal. Cheese comes from dairy cow, sheep or goats. For this activity, the soft cheese comes from the goat. Even though we raise beef and dairy cattle, they are combined on one page. The same is true for goats. We do not process horses in the United States therefore the products listed are items used to ride or care for horses. Please emphasize that a saddle is not made from a horse, but is used on a horse.

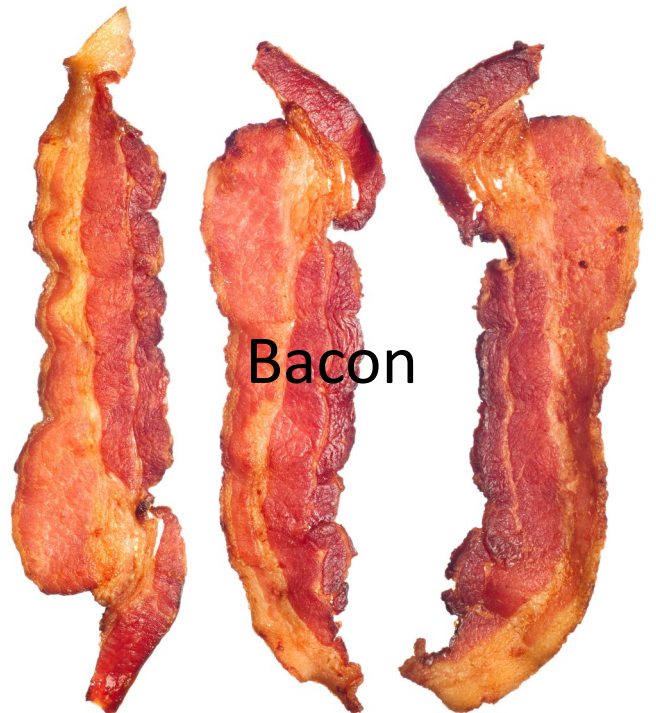

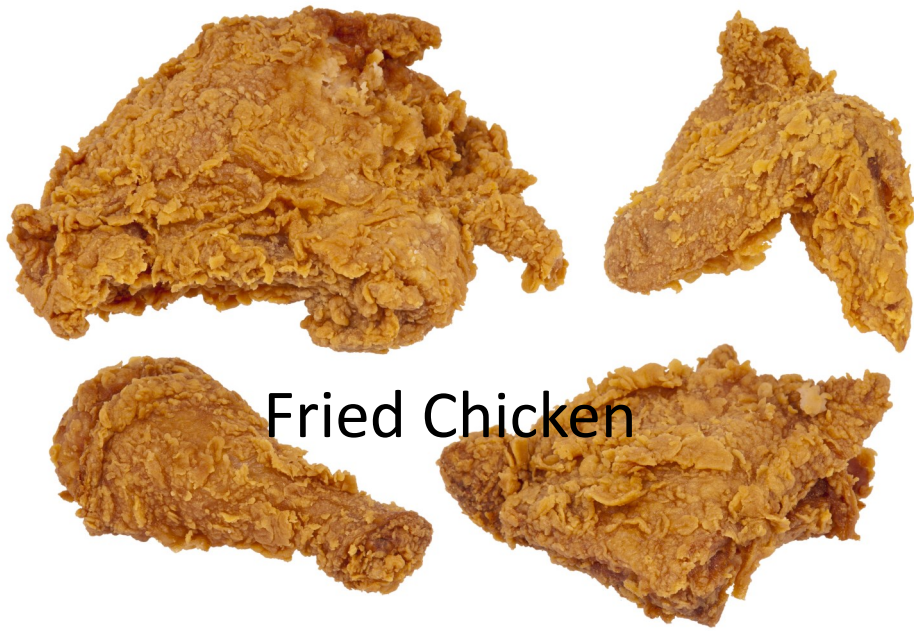

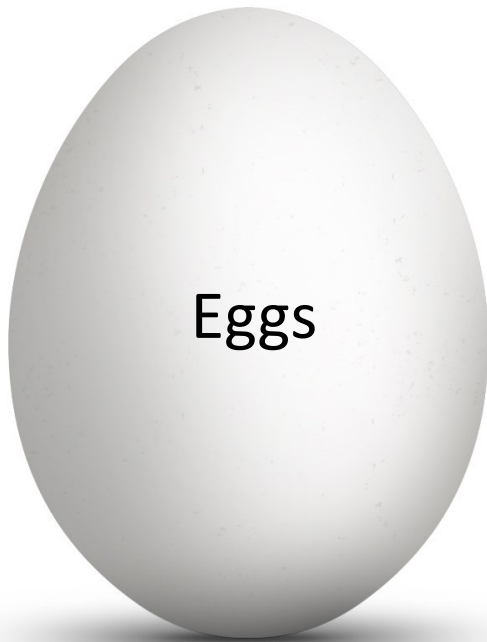
