Essential Planning Steps to Passport to the Farm Camp

- Marketing brochure to send to local schools
- Recruitment of Volunteers to serve in multiple roles: Group Leaders, Helpers, Presenters
- Registration of campers
- Mailing of confirmation letters via mail and email (campers and volunteers)
- Ordering of materials including bags, supplies
- Creation of passports, name tags, writing names on bags, stuffing bags
- Development of stations/site set up
- Development of daily letters, evaluations
- Purchase of snacks and final day pizza party
- Contacting of local media
- First aid procedure/supplies
- Development of binder containing all emergency contact #'s for parents
- Set up of tables/venue for week of programming
- Establishing sign in procedures for 1st day and end of day pick-up
- Writing of thank you notes to volunteers

Dear Camper,

We are just two weeks away from our Passport to the Farm Summer Camp and can't wait to meet you! The four days will be filled with tons of learning about agriculture and farming in Illinois. We'll be doing some reading, crafting, and interacting with machines and animals. Here are some important things about our camp:

*Be on time each day, but not too early. On the first day, 7/22, have a parent or guardian walk you into the main entrance of the Chicago High School for Ag Sciences (3857 W. 111th St.) at 9:15 a.m. where you will sign in, get your name badge and be placed in your group for the four days. You will need to leave the attached photo release form when you arrive on Day One. After Day One, come in the same door and your group leader will be there waiting for you.

*At the end of each day, we will wait out front for your ride home. Please have someone pick you up at 11:30 a.m. each day. You will leave your name badge at camp.

*Dress comfortable. We will be inside (air conditioned) and outside (may be hot or muddy). Closed toe shoes may work best! If you want to bring a water bottle, that's fine. Just be sure you can keep track of it. There are some water fountains in the school. Each day we will have a snack and drink at 11:15.




