Utilizing the Mini-Grant funding, DeSoto County 4-H hosted a multi day AgExplorations camp for DeSoto County teens interested in learning and teaching others about Agriculture. Through this program, DeSoto County youth were able to gain a better understanding of various aspects of the agricultural industry. They did this through visits to several locations including the Arcadia Livestock Market, a national sod producer – Bethel Farms, Sun Bulb – a national Orchid Producer, Sandhill Native Growers, Island Grove Blueberries and a local Fish Farm. In addition, youth attended ONA youth field day presented by UF/IFAS Extension. Throughout this program, youth not only gained knowledge, but they gained the ability to prepare and present elevator speeches on specific topics as they become youth Ag-Ambassadors escriptio

for Agriculture in our county. Following the 3 day camp, the youth participated in job-shadowing of various ag-careers on an individual basis. Currently, youth are creating and presenting cooperative lesson plans to 3rd grade youth at the local elementary schools.

Summer Ag-Exploration Program

DeSoto County 4-H will be hosting a Summer Program focusing on Agriculture. This program is limited to 10 participants and will be held on multiple days throughout the summer. During this program, participants age 13-18 will participate in a multi-day Agricultural tour of facilities and properties in several counties that are somehow related to agriculture as well as participating in job shadowing and STEM & agriculture related experiments and activities. Following these workshops, students will work with elementary aged youth to teach them about agriculture in a classroom setting.

Community Service hours will be awarded to participants who complete the program. Due to the fact that entry into this program will be very competitive, all prospective participants will be required to submit an application to DeSoto County 4-H. All applications must be turned in on or before April 10[,] 2015 to the school guidance counselor or the DeSoto County Extension Office.

AG-EXPLORATIONS PROGRAM CODE OF CONDUCT

As a participant in the AgExplorations program, I have the responsibility of representing the county 4-H and FFA Programs to the public. Therefore, I am expected to conduct myself in a manner that will bring honor to me, my family, my community, and 4-H & FFA. To do that, I must abide by the following rules:

 Obey local, state, and federal laws. Follow county, district, state and/or national 4-H & FFA policies. Abide by any special rules for a 4-H/FFA event or activity.

Speak and act in a responsible, courteous, and respectful way. Harassment, threats or bullying of any type is prohibited.

Act responsibly to maintain a safe environment for all participants. Acting in a manner that could endanger the health, safety or welfare of yourself or others is prohibited. Report threats to the well-being of any participant immediately to the adult in charge.

4. Possession or use of tobacco, alcohol, or illegal drugs is prohibited. Possession or use of approved medications by youth during a 4-H or FFA function must be reported to the adult in charge and must not be accessible to other participants.

5. Possession or use of weapons or other dangerous objects is prohibited, except when required as part of an approved educational program. Weapons are defined to include, but are not limited to, guns, knives and incendiary or explosive devices of any kind.

preferred in addition to jeans without rips or holes and close toed shoes.



(If an adult is suspected, this will be handled by law enforcement.) 11. Attendance at all AgExplorations functions is mandatory. These functions will include activities taking place June 22^{re} through June 25^{rb}, a follow-up meeting on August 13th, a visit to the Board of County Commissioners as well as the School Board, and teaching responsibilities at a local elementary during the 2015-2016 school year.

Failure to abide by this Code of Conduct in its entirety could result in a loss of privileges during a 4-H or FFA event and in the future; including but not limited to suspension or termination of 4-H and/or FFA membership or volunteer service.







Results

10 Desoto County Youth (High School Aged) participated in this program gaining life skills which they are utilizing in day to day life. Through this program, all 10 youth established and utilized elevator speeches and lesson plans to educate the community about the 4-H AgExplorations program and Agriculture.

All students increased their knowledge of Ag Operations in DeSoto County and Florida.

All youth who participated felt that they gained workforce preparation skills and this was also evidenced through activities which they took part in.
